
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## Firestorm – January 7<sup>th</sup>, 2025

#### A Message from **PASTOR JAE**

#### "Through the Fire, Together in Faith"



Recently, our community faced a disaster that shook us all—the wildfires that swept through our neighborhoods, Altadena, North Pasadena and Sierra Madre, leaving behind a trail of destruction and grief. It began on the evening of January 7 in Eaton Canyon in the San Gabriel Mountains, and quickly spread with the windstorm. As

soon as the evacuation order was issued, there was no time to linger—we had to leave our homes behind, grabbing what little we could and praying for the rest. The fire has burned approximately 14,000 acres. An estimated 9,400 structures — homes, schools, houses of worship and businesses — were destroyed, resulting in at least 17 deaths. It's hard to put into words the emotions of these past days, but let me share a glimpse of what I witnessed.

On Wednesday morning after the fires hit us, I made my way back to church, my heart weighed down with concern. Driving through Altadena and Hastings Ranch, the devastation was overwhelming. Some houses had been reduced to ashes. As I made my way through familiar streets, searching for the homes of our fellow church families, my heart ached at the sight of such devastation. Yet, I also found moments of unexpected relief—many houses stood miraculously untouched.

I felt a deep need to check on Joe and Peggy's home. As I approached, the devastation around them was overwhelming. The house next door had suffered severe fire damage, and the homes just westward all burned down. But then there it was—Joe and Peggy's house—standing, unharmed. I was deeply relieved.



Then, as I stood there at a loss, torn between sorrow and thankfulness, I noticed one of the neighbors standing before a smoldering house. She was wrapped in a blanket and introduced herself as Michelle. Her home was gone.

It struck me how raw moments like that can feel. Michelle, standing in front of her burned-down home, seemed to have already shed all her tears. She spoke calmly, as if she had come to terms with her loss. Meanwhile, I found myself struggling to hold back my tears. Perhaps it was the weight of witnessing such profound loss. Moments like this show us how human we really are—the weight of loss, the fragility of life, and the surprising strength some people show in the face of devastation.

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How do we move forward from this devastation? What immediate actions do we need to take for relief and recovery? Thankfully, World Central Kitchen stepped in for free lunch. In response to the do-not-drink tap water notification alert, our church also stepped in, working in partnership with Pasadena Frist United Methodist Church for clean water supplies. Our church volunteers welcomed visitors, offered listening ears, and created a small post of service and listening. It was a busy week, and most of us felt exhausted—but in that exhaustion, we found blessing. God turned our church into a place of hope in the middle of this

fire crisis. I am thankful. I am proud.

"Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing" (Matthew 25:34-35).



What do you think truly matters in times of crisis? What would you hold onto in moments of real challenge? Maybe this is a time to pause and reflect. Standing together with them, we learned what we are to be. What I saw and experienced was more than just a community—it was the kingdom of God in action. In times of challenge, the true essence of the church was revealed. I saw again why God calls us to build community—because

the Bible, the kingdom of God is the very heartbeat of Jesus' ministry.

"Bear one another's burdens, and in this way, you will fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2).

This is the conviction that I learned. In loss and challenge, the kingdom of God comes alive when we care for one another. As we rebuild, let's be that community—bearing burdens, sharing hope, and shining His light. This is what it means to be the body of Christ. In the ashes, we found purpose. In the darkness, we became light. This is who we are. This is what we do. I am grateful.

Dear Preacher,



As we were getting ready to leave I noticed a sign that was hung on the wall to the side parking lot entrance. It said:


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"By faith, we've come this far.


